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
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Catalina



contestants. Ten years later, the club changed its name to the Cape Yacht Club, then was acknowledged by the king, forming the Royal Cape Yacht Club.

> An Honor to go to Work By Tiffany Tokar-Vlasek

Friday night, September 14, 2001: the phone rings, and a voice says, "Hi, TWA crew scheduling looking for First Officer Tiffany Vlasek. Good news, we're going to extend your rest."

"Uh,...ok...why?"

"Well, we've got a trip for you tomorrow...."

And so it began...after being glued to the news for four days straight, I was being sent into battle, so to speak. From an airline pilot's perspective (as well as the rest of humanity), these attacks are so unbelievably heinous. To think that some idiot would take my airplane away from me, and use it to kill thousands of innocent people is beyond comprehension. But now my company was calling and asking for my help.

Crew scheduling had no details really, just take an airplane to Portland, OR, fly to STL and then deadhead home the next day. Since we don't provide service to Portland from SJC, I questioned what was happening. Was this a ferry, a charter or what? They didn't know...so I went to bed, got up Saturday morning and got ready to go to work. My husband Vance (also a TWA pilot), walked me out to the sidewalk and told me that he loved me; our goodbye hug and kiss was a little longer and tighter than normal. "Fly safe," he said. As I drove around the corner, I looked back and he was standing there waving while our cats played at his feet, our American flag waving behind him.

I arrived at the airport, met the Captain, and we discussed what was going on. Apparently, we were repositioning an empty aircraft to Portland and we would fly a load of passengers to STL. We had all kinds of new security measures that we had to comply with, such as a full interior inspection of the aircraft, as well as many other things. Under the circumstances, the Captain said we would not rush, and we would not leave until we both agreed that the flight could be conducted safely and we had met all new security requirements. I did a complete a thorough exterior inspection, and because we had no flight attendants on this leg, I secured the galleys as well. I then helped the ground personnel inspect the cabin, and eventually made my way up to the flight deck to assist the Captain and get myself ready to fly.

We finally got under way to PDX. At cruise, the Captain and I discussed how the next leg would go. We talked about the new flight attendant briefing, how we would secure the cockpit, what we would do in the event that someone tried to gain access to the flight deck, etc. This discussion went on for the whole flight. There were company memos to read, and the Captain pointed out a little part of the flight dispatch document that contained a disturbing paragraph; it basically said that all aircraft would now be subject to in-flight interceptions by military aircraft, and that if we were intercepted, we would monitor the emergency frequency and follow any instructions from the intercept aircraft. "My God," I muttered, after reading it. "Yup," was his only reply.

We landed in PDX and the ground crew immediately jumped into action. The Captain went to get the paperwork, I prepared the flight deck for the next leg, we got catering, aircraft was fueled, our New York-based flight attendants came on board (they were practically catatonic with grief), and we began to board the passengers. We did all this rather quickly, and soon were ready to go. The agents closed the cabin door, flight attendants gave the "cabin secure" and closed the cockpit door…and then it opened again. The door was locked from our side but the flight attendant was able to open it from her side. We opened and closed the door a bunch of times to no avail. The door was not locking properly. Unbelievable.

Since we didn't have our own maintenance in PDX, we contracted with DAL. I happened to look out onto the ramp and saw the two Delta mechanics running towards our jet. You have to understand...mechanics don't run. Ever. Ultimately, they had to remove the door completely and mess around with it, but they had it fixed in short order. This soon became a team effort because we had the door out in the jetway and the Captain held onto it while the mechanics worked on the latch at the top. I became the designated "fastener holder." I had one set of screws in one pants pocket, another set in my other pocket, and a third set in a coffee cup in my hands. While this was going on, one of our agents approached me with a story. Turns out we had four Portland-based firefighters on board that were trying to get to NY to help in the recovery efforts. They had waited for 18 hours at a charter company to get out but never could. They gave up, came to the commercial terminal and tried all the airlines to find one that could give them a reasonable fare. Walk-up fares are close to \$1200, and since they were paying for this out of their own pockets, they were hoping someone would cut them a break. No one did until they tried TWA. Our agents gave them the 14-day advance fare (\$400) and put them in First Class. I about fell over when I heard this. These guys were taking their own time, leaving their families to fly cross-country to help out and I was going to get to fly them there. So awesome. I decided I had to share the news.

I grabbed the PA at the front of the aircraft, and stood in front of the First-Class cabin so the passengers could see me as well as hear me. I informed the passengers that the cockpit door issue had been resolved, the mechanics were finishing up the paperwork and that we would be under way shortly. I apologized profusely for the delay but stated that, considering the events of the week, that this was not an issue we could ignorel. I then added the following: "I also wanted to share some good news. It has come to our attention that we have four Portland firefighters on board that are going to New York at their own expense to help in the recovery efforts." At this point, all the passengers started to clap, and I felt myself start to lose it. It took every ounce of restraint I had to not burst into tears, but my voice started to crack anyway. I said, "Gentlemen, thank you so much for what you are doing. We will get you there." I turned around and went up to the cockpit. I had to just sit down, close my eyes and breathe deeply; I was so overcome with emotion.

Once again, we got under way. The first hour or so we picked our way around some weather and then the skies finally opened up and we had smooth sailing the rest of the way. One of the things that was so different on this day was that the ATC radio was dead silent. The Captain called for a radio check more than once, because it was so unusually quiet. Every reply sounded something like... "TWA, this is Denver Center, we're here. We got you."

About halfway through the flight, I left the flight deck to use the lav. As soon as I came out, there was one of the firefighters standing there waiting for me. He grabbed my arm and thanked me profusely for my words. He said that as I was talking about them, he looked over at his buddy and saw tears streaming down his cheek. They were so touched by all of our efforts on their behalf. I assured him that we were the ones that were honored to be able to transport them, if only partway on their journey. While we were talking, all the other guys came up and talked to me too. The said that everyone at their firehouse was involved in this. Co- workers left behind were covering their shifts; their spouses all fully supported them as well. They said that even if all they do is vacuum someone's house, or mow a lawn, or just stand behind another firefighter to catch them if they fall, then that would be enough. Wow. One of them handed me a wadded-up T-shirt. He sort of thrust it into my hands, and as he turned away said, "It's an X-large and I wore it yesterday so you might want to wash it." He had taken it out of his bag just to have something to give me. I was again completely overwhelmed.

As we got in-range to STL, we called our ground personnel over the radio and gave them our ETA. We also told them about the firefighters and asked them to do everything they could to make sure these guys connected to their LGA flight. After we landed, we taxied to gate D-6. The LGA flight was leaving from D-4. Perfect.

After shutting down the aircraft, I jumped out of my seat to say goodbye and good luck to them and all the other passengers. An agent came on board and escorted the firefighters next door to the LGA flight and right into four more First Class seats. Everyone thanked us for a safe flight. Most of these people had been stuck in PDX for three or more days and were finally going home. I was glad to be able to get them there. Yesterday, it was an honor to go to work.
