I thought it would be great to wrap up this year with something enjoyable! Since the dawn of (mari)time, both sailors and non-sailors have created superstitions that have been handed down through generations, many of which have transformed into TRADITIONS! Over time, these traditions have evolved, often shedding their original superstitious meanings while remaining part of various cultures. Some of these may sound familiar, but keep reading—some of them are truly fascinating!

No Whistling on Board a boat because

by whistling, you could "whistle up a storm. **Knocking on Wood**: It stems from ancient beliefs that spirits residing in trees could provide

protection. Never Rename a Ship, as it can bring bad luck to change the name of a boat. But this can be remedied with a renaming ceremony with LOTS of champagne. Throwing Salt Over Your Shoulder: The act of throwing salt over the left shoulder specifically is said to blind any lurking evil spirits, preventing them from causing harm. Black Cats on ships since all cats were considered good luck and believed to bring calm seas and protection. Turning a boat clockwise was considered unlucky – all turns should be made counter-clockwise. Keep onions because in some cultures, hanging onions on a ship was believed to repel evil spirits. Stirring tea with a knife or fork invites bad luck. Turning a loaf of bread upside down once it has been cut brings bad luck. Never Say Goodbye so instead of saying goodbye, sailors often prefer terms like farewell or until we meet again – saying goodbye was believed to mean you would never see that person again. New Year's Eve Traditions: Many customs associated with New Year's Eve, such as eating 12 grapes at midnight or making noise to scare away evil spirits, stem from superstitions aimed at ensuring good luck and prosperity in the coming year.


Happy holidays to my baking friends! As many of you know, during the pandemic, I baked about every two to three days to maintain my sanity. And I put those quick breads, cupcakes, muffins, cookies, cakes, bars etc into our little wagon and I delivered those items around the SeaGate and Trinidad neighborhoods to our friends.

I have always loved to bake, a lot more than actual cooking, and I've gotten pretty good at it. My favorite thing to do is doctor up a cake mix with additional ingredients, and I love to add booze the most. It probably started with this recipe.

Way back in the before times...the 1980's, I was attending West Valley Community College in Saratoga, California and I took a speech class. One of our assignments was to give a "demonstrative" speech. I have no idea what I did for that assignment but one of my classmates demonstrated making this cake. And then she had the finished product for us all to try. It was so flippin good, that I snagged the recipe, and I've been making this cake for almost 40 years. My mother even likes it, even though she is a teetotaler by nature. She had to buy the Kahlua and vodka at a little liquor store down the street and I think she was afraid some of her fellow church ladies would seeing her entering or exiting the liquor store and she'd lose her "church lady" high status. It's that good. And so simple.

My mother even typed up the recipe on the card pictured below (on a real typewriter, remember those?) and she put it, along with many other family favorites, in a recipe card file that she made me for my wedding. It's stained, wrinkled, faded, but frankly, I hardly need it since I've made this cake so many times, I practically have the recipe memorized.

But here it is just for you to try.
There are variations you can try, such as substituting vodka or water instead of the Kahlua to go with the powdered sugar for the icing. I think the Kahlua is the best



though. The vodka is too strong...but you do you! Enjoy and happy baking!

Black Russian Cake

1 yellow cake mix

1 4oz instant chocolate pudding mix

4 eggs

1 cup oil

1/4 cup vodka

1/4 cup Kahlua



Blend all ingredients for 3 minutes with a mixer. Bake in a Bundt pan at 325 degrees for 45 minutes. Test with toothpick, your oven may vary.

Icing: 1 cup powdered sugar

Kahlua/vodka/water to liquify and pour over cake. (Poke holes in cake if you wish to allow frosting to settle in a bit, cuz why not?!)

Another variation: substitute orange juice / Cointreau instead of Kahlua for a Chocolate Wallbanger mod. Let me know what you think!!



Mister Tech Tip

Mr. Tech Tip attempts to answer your questions about boat mechanical maintenance and repair

Decking the Hulls! Aaron Dumont is the SE Regional Manager of Sportsman Boats, and has this to say about how to go about lighting a boat for a parade:

In the South, Christmas parades come in all forms—golf carts, ATVs, and my personal favorite, Christmas boat parades. For the past eight years, I've had the privilege of helping organize our local Christmas Boat Parade, and every year, I hear the same question: "How do I properly light and power my boat for the parade?" Well, you're in luck! In this blog, I'll share my tips for creating a show-stopping Christmas boat, covering three key areas: choosing the right colors, fastening your lights securely, and powering them efficiently.

1. Choosing the Right Colors

When decorating your boat, visibility and aesthetics go hand in hand. I usually go all out with over 4,000 LED mini lights in various colors and patterns, but placement is just as important as quantity. Here's what I've learned:

- **Keep your line of sight clear:** Think of it like car dashboard lights—illuminated enough to see but not glaring. Avoid using bright white lights above the rub rail and below the hardtop to prevent glare or blind spots.
- Stick to nighttime-friendly colors around the console: Green, blue, or red lights work well as they enhance visibility without being overpowering.
- Strategic use of bright white lights: Use white lights below the rub rail or above the hardtop to avoid direct visibility.
- **Plan your wiring:** Set up your lights so that you only need a few main power connections running back to your power source. This simplifies the setup and reduces the risk of tangled wiring.

2. Fastening Your Lights Securely

Securely attaching lights to your boat is critical, especially in windy or damp conditions. Here are the best methods:

- White shrink wrap tape: Available at most marine stores, this tape is sticky, long-lasting, and leaves no residue on your boat. Use it around the perimeter, on the hardtop, and in areas without fastening points.
- **Zip ties:** These are perfect for securing lights but don't overtighten them, making removal easier after the season. Opt for inexpensive zip ties for easy removal.
- Cleat-to-cleat string lines: For areas without fastening points, tie a string from one cleat to another and hang your lights on it. This technique allows you to decorate areas that are typically out of reach.

3. Powering Your Lights

Lighting up a boat requires significant power, and there are two reliable options:

- Small gas generator: Mount a small generator on your swim platform or transom (with the exhaust facing outward) and connect it to a surge protector. This method supports a large number of lights without draining your boat's battery.
- Power inverter: Choose a high-output inverter and connect it to the battery being charged by your motor. Be sure to track the wattage of your lights to avoid overloading the inverter. Inverters are widely available at hardware stores and typically come with gator clips for easy battery hookup.



Final Thoughts

Christmas boat parades are a magical experience for the entire family, and with these tips, your boat is sure to shine brightly. 

This issue's Great Shots includes some bird photos submitted by members and some fun shots of (shhhh!) Santa in a boat!






