

Now imagine a Seagate Fire, one that turns all 336 households into smokey cinders, maybe takes out Seabridge too. Just think of the homelessness and loss. Could there be a lifeline for a situation such as that? Our neighbors to the North are hoping the answer is Yes.

It's hard to know how to help.
The SGYC Ship Store attempted to
donate clothing, but was told there was
already too much clothing, particularly
for people who no longer have closets.
A neighboring yacht club did a
successful jacket drive, which was
gratefully received due to the cold
weather we've been having. Other
people are offering to temporarily house
a needy family, and one local mariner



even delivered several dozen buckets to fire victims who are combing through the rubble of their homes seeking salvageable items.

The State of California has arranged for houses of worship in the Altadena / Pasadena area to be a lifeline to the community there. There aren't many left; over a dozen Churches have burned, and the few that remain are burdened with many of their own parishioners who have suffered total loss.

Lately, Altadena based Victory Church has served as a much-needed lifeline for their fire-ravished community. Those seeking to help or get help can reach them at www.vbcpasadena.org/eatonfire/. The County of Los Angeles has also set up an online portal with links to funds that have been set up to help first responders and fire victims with housing, employment and recovery: https://lacounty.gov/relief/.





# Sand Dollar Cookies


Valentine was ultimately executed for his rebellion to the edict. It's said that the last words he wrote inspired today's most romantic salutation: 'from your Valentine.'

says they planned to take their clients with them to the new o ice, but the boss found out and fired them for ethical violations.



# CA Boater's Card



This year, all boaters, regardless of age, must have and posses a California Boater Card if you will be operating a vessel on any body of water in California. The California Boater Card shows that its holder has successfully taken and passed a state-approved boater safety education examination. As of January 1 2025, all persons who operate a vessel on California waters will be required to have one.

All Boaters here means All, so even our SGYC Duffy Pilots are going to need a California Boater Card. Learn more at CaliforniaBoaterCard.com.


We at SGYC headquarters would like to thank each and every one of you for your photographic contributions. KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK!

## On Altadena

I am in shock and mourning for my beloved <u>hashtag#Altadena</u>. When buying my current home, I first put several offers on homes in Altadena that weren't accepted.

I have always been fascinated and infatuated with Altadena, first developed in the 1880s. Western rancher libertarian meets hippie chic meets Black culture panache. It has been known as the Black Beverly Hills and stood in for Beverly Hills on many TV shows. It is a JPL and CalTech bedroom community filled with professors and scientists. I have a friend, a top film industry costume designer, who owns a goat ranch. The foothill town is also home to several monasteries.

Altadena has a culture and history like no other. I loved meeting friends at Fox's for home-smoked pork with redeye gravy, Perry's Joint for sandwiches, or El Patron for Mexican. I started attending the free summer concerts at Farnsworth Park, my favorite park anywhere.

General Charles S. Farnsworth was a decorated General and hero of World War I, winning a Silver Star, the French Croix de Guerre, and the Legion of Honor for his bravery in battle. He mentored and trained his junior officers, including Patton and Eisenhower. He retired to Altadena and, in 1931, was the Rose Parade Grand Marshal. He helped get the park built as a Works Progress Administration (WPA) project. It opened in 1934 as part of the WPA to get people working during the Great Depression. Even though it was built in the thirties, it held the best aspects of Arts & Crafts architecture. From several spots at the park, you can see all of LA County on a clear day, all the way to Catalina.

After attending some concerts there, I attended the Rotary Club meetings at the beautiful Altadena Town & Country Club (established in 1910) and joined the club as it celebrated it's 75th anniversary. Last year was our 27th year hosting the Farnsworth concerts and our most successful. I love Pasadena, but I have been having a long-term affair with Altadena.

Now, our Farnsworth Park building is gone. Our country club is gone. Fox's is gone. The McNally house and its legendary cigar lounge, which I only saw on my favorite episode of my favorite TV show, Restored with Bret Waterman, is gone. So many other businesses, houses of worship, and historic sites that held the culture of Altadena are gone.

Where else but Altadena would you have a bike shop that is also a Bunny Museum? Gone. My friend's goat ranch is gone. She is now in my guest house. Monasteries and schools in historic homes are gone, too.

We must mourn. As Altadena rebuilds, which will take a long time, it will redefine itself for the next 150 years, but it will never be quite the same.

This is why I am so proud to have this job. Historic preservation is such an essential and defining element of who we are as a community. Let's always treasure what we have. We will continue to help Altadena in any way we can with what they need and archive what was lost.
