The Valiant, by Patrick Smith

For many in SGYC, the run to Catalina and Avalon is an often enjoyed pleasure. The grandeur of the world famous Casino and the Mediterranean-esque beauty of the pastel houses that climb the surrounding hillsides are just a couple of the esthetic aspects that draw us back again and again. But for some of us the aesthetics, nearness and services (not to mention Big Olaf's) provided at the island are secondary to certain aspects of maritime history that most visitors are totally unaware of.

On the seafloor of Descanso Bay, just east of the Casino lay the remains of what was once the world's largest privately owned yacht. A mere shore boat by today's mega-yacht standards, the VALIANT (launched as ARAS) was the biggest and best with her launch in 1926. Designed by Cox & Stevens and built to the highest and most elegant standards by Newport News Shipbuilding, the 162-foot long vessel, had a cruising range of 5,500 nautical miles and a cruising speed of 16 knots. Said to be the first American yacht to be built with double-bottom hull for water and fuel tanks the vessel was luxuriously appointed throughout and included a playroom for the owners' children and thirteen tiled bathrooms.

For unknown reasons, the vessel's first owner sold the ship to Charles Howard the same year she was launched. Howard, a wealthy entrepreneur and inventor, owner of the Howard Motor Company is probably better known as the owner of the horseracing legend, Seabiscuit. Howard re-named the vessel VALIANT and, being a member of the prestigious St. Francis Yacht Club, he cruised the vessel extensively along the West Coast and throughout Pacific.

These happy sojourns came to a dramatic end in December 1930 when while peacefully anchored in Descanso Bay, the VALIANT was ripped by several explosions, caught fire and, fueled by the 3,000 p gallons of diesel fuel aboard, burned for the next three days. Howard, his family, quests and crew all escaped. Four crewmen with minor injuries and one crewman with serious burns were taken to Avalon's hospital for treatment.

There was salvage carried out on the yacht, but for the most part her hull remains mostly unknown and rarely considered by modern-day visitors; an intriguing piece of maritime history beneath the waters of Descanso Bay.
